NOTES FROM QUARTERLY STATE MEETING

Lt Col Dowd Division hosted the first quarterly state meeting in the 2017-2019 term on November 4th. Ten of our 14 divisions participated in the meeting, including two via teleconferencing. The Order's Major Degrees were conferred on 21 candidates representing six divisions. The VAAOH slogan for this term is "**COMMIT TO THE FUTURE**". This is a call for revitalization of recruitment efforts and retention of our current membership. The role of division Organizers in this task was emphasized.

Veterans Affairs, new Forms formats (all on line and "fillable") and the new National AOH logo (see below) were discussed. The appeal to Congress to press the Library of Congress for IAHM recognition was a success: Now IAHM should appear on television, in schools, etc., during March. There is a separate effort to gain legislation in the Commonwealth to legalize the annual proclamation of IAHM. The anti-Irish article in *Newsweek* (and related articles) that were analyzed by our Brother Peter Carroll was discussed and subsequently sent to National AOH and all VA divisions.

On November 7th, the division honored our deceased brothers with Mass celebrated by our Chaplain, Farther Jerry Wooton at St Mary in Fredericksburg. Freedom for All Ireland Fund Raiser

Jack Kehoe's Hibernian House





Virginia State FFAI co-chairmen, Jim McLaughlin and Terry Riley organized a wonderful field trip to the Pennsylvania coal region for a look into the AOH history plus a private tour of the historic Yuengling Brewery in Pottsville. Among the 15 Hibernians and spouses on the trip were Meagher Division brothers Hogan, McLaughlin, Halpin, and Mulhern. After the tour and while en route to Girardsville we stopped briefly at the Mauch Chunk (now Jim Thorpe) courthouse where 13 Hibernians were railroaded with trumped up charges, sat through a "show" trail, were found guilty, and where seven of them were hanged, including, the last man standing, Jack Kehoe.

At left, Hibernian Joe Wayne, Jack Kehoe's great grandson and current owner of the Hibernian House in Girardsville, captured everyone's the undivided attention as he explained the frequently misguided stories surrounding the plight of Irish coal miners, the Hibernians, and the "Mollie Maguires" (see also our 30th Anniversary pamphlet).

Joe told us the Hibernian House has been in his family since about 1870. His Great Grandfather, Joe Kehoe, held AOH meetings there, as Joe still does today. He has a vast collection of AOH memorabilia, much of it still used in traditional AOH ceremonies. The walls are covered with photos, murals and artifacts. The Hibernian House is time capsule and should be on every Hibernian's bucket list.



"The Celt would forfeit his title to the respect of the civilized world, did he not fight with all his heart and all his soul and all his cunning against the empire which has despoiled him and murdered his kin, now with arms, now with artificial famine. There can be no peace between the two people until either Ireland is a desert or is free. It is war to the knife, and the knife to the hilt. There can be neither truce nor compromise."

2017 - A YEAR OF THREE IMPORTANT ANNIVERSARIES

In addition to celebrating our 30th year of Friendship, Unity and true Christian Charity in Spotsylvania and Fredericksburg, 2017 commemorates 150th anniversary the death of Thomas Francis Meagher and marks the 170th anniversary of "Black 47", the start of *An Gorta Mor*.

The famine was a turning point in Irish history and its effects permanently changed the island's demographic, political, and cultural landscapes. According to one source, in 1841 8.2 million people lived in Ireland; by 1900 that number was about 3 millionⁱ, thus creating the Irish diaspora we know today.

Catholics, most living in poverty, made up 80% of the Irish population. For 200 years Catholics were prohibited from purchasing or leasing land, from voting, from holding political office, from living in or near a corporate town, from obtaining education, from entering a profession, and from doing many other things necessary for a person to succeed and prosper in society. Irish properties were owned by (primarily) absentee, Protestant landlords who used middlemen to extract rents from Irish tenant farmers. By and large these intervenors were crooks who demanded rents in excess of the authorized amount. In 1845, 60% of Irish tenant farms were less than 15 acres, too small for any crop other than potatoes, which became the family staple.

An article written by John Mitchel on "English Rule" appeared in <u>*The Nation*</u> on 7 March 1846. Mitchel wrote that the Irish People were "expecting famine day by day", and that they attributed it collectively not to "the rule of heaven as to the greedy and cruel policy of England." Further, he wrote that the people watched their "food melting in rottenness off the face of the earth", all the while watching "heavy-laden ships, freighted with the yellow corn their own hands have sown and reaped, spreading all sail for England."

The famine became a rallying point for Irish nationalism and republicanism at home and in the United States. John Mitchel became a leading member of both Young Ireland and the Irish Confederation. As we know, "*Meagher of the Sword*" was a leader in the Young Ireland movement and in subsequent the rebellion of 1848.

AOH Sash: Brothers procure their own sashes. The AOH tri-color sash represents the national colors of Ireland and should be worn over the right shoulder (green closest to neck/collar) crossing to the left hip. Measure from right shoulder to left hip in inches; keep in mind the sash will normally be worn over a jacket, possibly a raincoat/overcoat (and maybe a growing waist line).
