Religious Freedom 2020

In the late 18th century (1777) Thomas Jefferson established the principle that “no man shall suffer on account of his religious opinions or beliefs.” That Virginia statute was incorporated into the U.S. Constitution as the First Amendment of the Bill of Rights.

The Ancient Order of Hibernians traces its heritage of religious freedom to the mid-16th century (1565) in Ireland and to the dark days of the mid-19th century (1836) in America when Irish Catholics organized in opposition to anti-Catholic and anti-Irish prejudice and violence.

The weather on January 12, 2020 was perfect -- warm and sunny -- for the 243rd anniversary of Jefferson’s Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom.

Five General Meagher Division brothers attended the ceremony. So here’s a *Tip of the Hat* to the five: Division President *Dave McLaughlin*, who marched from the train station to the Religious Freedom Monument and *Neil Buttimer*, *Peter Carroll* and *Bill Halpin*. Father Don Rooney, who remains on our division roster, was the featured speaker. Dave was interviewed by a *Free Lance Star* reporter. This is what he said:

“Jefferson’s work is timeless, and although there are struggles associated with religious differences and beliefs, the historic document has survived the challenges to benefit all Americans. Jefferson’s document became the bedrock, the foundation of what became freedom of religion as espoused in the First Amendment. It’s a beautiful document, it’s survived centuries of challenge, and we’ve dealt with it. The document has worked over the centuries.”

Four Chaplains Day...The Story

On Feb. 3, 1943, an enemy torpedo struck the Army transport ship *Dorchester* as sailed across the North Atlantic. Onboard were 902 officers and enlisted men, merchant seamen and civilian workers.

As *Dorchester* took on water, four Army chaplains – Lt. George L. Fox (Methodist), Lt. Alexander D. Goode (Jewish), Lt. John P. Washington (Roman Catholic), and Lt. Clark V. Poling (Dutch Reformed) – calmed frightened soldiers, aided the wounded and guided the disoriented toward safety.

On deck they opened a storage locker and began distributing life jackets. When there were no more the chaplains removed their life jackets and gave them to four young men. “It was the finest thing I have seen or hope to see this side of heaven,” said John Ladd, a survivor.

As the ship went down, men in rafts saw the four chaplains, arms linked and braced against the slanting deck, singing hymns and praying. The Coast Guard cutter escorts *Comanche* and *Escanaba* rescued only 230 men.

Congress attempted to confer the Medal of Honor on the chaplains but was prevented by strict requirements of heroism under fire. It authorized a one-time posthumous Special Medal for Heroism, awarded by President Eisenhower in 1961; it was intended to have the same weight and importance as the Medal of Honor.



Why Irish Single Malt Whiskeys Deserve Your Attention

When people think of buying single malt whiskies, Scotland probably come to mind. Yet the originators of whiskey itself — the Irish — are making a wide range of excellent single malts, with a modern renaissance now matching their storied history and tradition.

“[Jameson](#) has been the top for the category, but there are more new single malt releases. “People are discovering, enjoying, and — perhaps most importantly — valuing Irish single malts in a way that was long reserved for Scotch.”

While [Irish whiskey](#) flourished for centuries, its modern story has been one of economic downturn and depression that nearly killed off the industry, while the survivors produced a more narrow breadth of styles with mass-market appeal. “Strong corporate forces have for decades influenced what people believe Irish whiskey ought to be, as opposed to what the global consumer actually wants,”

Eventually there were only two distilleries in Ireland, both under one corporate umbrella. One of those survivors is [The Old Bushmills Distillery](#), and today Bushmills is at the forefront of the movement to push forward quality and innovation. “We always say, ‘we’re not good because we’re old, we’re old because we’re good’,” says master blender Helen Mulholland.

Bushmills lineup includes 10 year, 16 year, and 21 year old expressions, along with limited-edition releases, such as the Distillery Exclusive uniquely matured in acacia wood casks. Irish single malts are growing in popularity as more people discover that Irish whiskey is wonderfully approachable.

At Waterford Distillery, the focus is exclusively on single malt and an ambitious initiative to highlight and differentiate the flavor of different types of barley along with the impact of terroir. That means making single malt whiskey and making the best expression of barley. Ireland it is perhaps the best barley-growing region in the world.

There are dozens of upstart distilleries in Ireland and many of them are showcasing the potential of Irish single malt whiskey. They’re joining Bushmills to make (single malt) an exciting mix of history and heritage while recreating a thriving industry.

Five Irish Single Malts to Try

Bushmills 21 Year Old

Christmas cake in liquid form, with zesty orange peel, spicy oak, chocolate, toffee, and dried fruits all mingling together. The whiskey is aged for 19 years in a combination of bourbon and sherry casks and is then finished for its final two years of maturation in Madeira casks.

Tyrconnell 16 Year Old Oloroso & Moscatel Cask Finish

This limited-edition expression from Tyrconnell was released in summer 2019. The whiskey is finished in casks that first held oloroso sherry and then were further seasoned

with Moscatel wine. The resulting flavor is an enticing combination of honey, fruits, and spice.

Teeling Single Malt

[Teeling's](#) self-distilled single malt, currently a non-age statement whiskey, is matured in a combination of five different wine casks, providing a complex base of rich, fruity flavors. Of course, should you be able to find any of the limited Teeling single malts bearing names such as Reserve, Revival, or Renaissance, snatch them up, too.

Glendalough 13 Year Mizunara Cask Finish

[Glendalough](#) took one of its core whiskeys, a sourced 13 year old single malt, and finished it in prized Japanese Mizunara oak casks. Though a limited release from 2018, you can still track down some remaining bottles that sport Mizunara's trademark incense and spice flavors.

Knappogue Castle 12 Year

The 12 year from [Knappogue Castle](#) is Murphy's go-to choice in the category, with the festival founder saying, "This is a favorite of mine, and the best part? You can pick up a bottle for under \$50." The bottle shows easy-sipping maturity beyond its age.

Waterford Distillery Single Farm Origin Series*

As a bonus pick, keep your eyes out late summer 2020 for the initial offering from Waterford. The Single Farm Origin Series will be a side-by-side release showcasing the differences in terroir, and taste, between single malt distillate made from barley grown on two different farms. "We hope to make the most profound single malt — and that process starts with where and how it grows: Irish terroir," Reynier says.

A united Ireland seems more possible now than at any point in our history

“Brexit has catapulted this issue forward,” says Pádraig Ó Muirigh, advisor to the Republican Sinn Féin Party. “There is a real sense that we’re living in historical times.” In October, U.K. Prime Minister Boris Johnson effectively agreed to place the de facto future border in the sea between mainland Britain and Northern Ireland. This put both Irelands – the Republic and Northern Ireland – in one economic zone. It also showed Unionists that the English Conservatives considered them expendable. In the Republic, Taoiseach Varadkar has said that Irish unification is something that he would like to see in his lifetime, but only with the consent of the majority of people in Northern Ireland. A group calling itself Ireland’s Future – consisting of 1,000 academics, artists, and public figures, including musicians Christy Moore and Mary Black – made an official request to the Taoiseach in October. It asked him to establish a citizen’s assembly on a united Ireland, in the hopes of holding a referendum on the issue in the near future. The government responded by saying that now was not the time for such action, but that it would consider the issue further.

A recent poll carried out in Northern Ireland found that 46 percent of people would vote for a united Ireland, while 45 percent would vote for the North to remain in the U.K. When those who said they didn’t know or wouldn’t vote were excluded, it broke down as 51 percent for unification and 49 percent against. Some 69 percent said they felt Brexit had made Irish unity more likely in the foreseeable future. ♦

Informal events (i.e. Division outings (ball games, picnics, meetings, etc.) the division logo polo or sweatshirts (optional ball cap) are appropriate.

AOH Sash: Brothers procure their own sashes. The AOH tri-color sash represents the national colors of Ireland and should be worn over the right shoulder (green closest to neck/collar) crossing to the left hip. Measure from right shoulder to left hip in inches; keep in mind the sash will normally be worn over a jacket, possibly a raincoat/overcoat (and maybe a growing waistline).
