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## How Irish an Irishman paved the way for Juneteenth,

Irish-born General Phil Sheridan is credited with a leading role in forcing General Robert E. Lee to surrender at Appomattox. He was also the man who ordered General Gordon Granger to proclaim the slaves free in Texas on June 19, 1865, what is now regarded as the unofficial '*Juneteenth*' holiday in the US.

As military governor of the <u>Fifth Military District</u> (Texas and Louisiana) after the civil war, Sheridan was determined that former slaves would never be exploited again, that white supremacists would be removed from powerful positions, and that the black man had the right to vote. He was so determined to push equality through that President Andrew Johnson, a Democrat and rebel supporter, had him removed.

But Sheridan's legacy in helping create Juneteenth should live on.

In part, the Juneteenth proclamation read by General Granger in Galveston reads, "The people of Texas are informed that, in accordance with a proclamation from the Executive of the United States, all slaves are free. This involves an absolute equality of personal rights and rights of property between former masters and slaves, and the connection heretofore existing between them becomes that between employer and hired labor."

President Johnson believed Sheridan was tyrannical because he wouldn't permit former Confederates vote and "unfairly" removed the white supremacist governors of Louisiana and Texas along with the mayor of New Orleans, the Louisiana attorney general, and a district judge. Over Grant's objections Johnson fired Sheridan.

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Irish the Forgotten White Slaves

Ireland was the greatest victim of British slave trade says expert John Martin (extracted from *Irish Central*, 28 Jan 2013)

The history of the African slave trade into the colonial America's is well-documented and taught in American schools today. However, as John Martin of the Montreal-based Center for Research and Globalization points out in his article <u>The Irish Slave Trade</u> - <u>The Forgotten 'White' Slaves</u> it was not just Africans who were traded as slaves.

The Irish have a gruesome history as being traded as slaves as well and subjected to similar and sometimes worse treatment than their African contemporaries of the time. Strangely though, the history of Irish and 'white' slavery is by and large ignored in the American educational curriculum today.

John Martin writes "The Irish slave trade began when James II sold 30,000 Irish prisoners as slaves to the New World. His Proclamation of 1625 required Irish political prisoners be sent overseas and sold to English settlers in the West Indies. By the mid-1600s, the Irish were the main slaves sold to Antigua and Montserrat. At that time, 70 percent of the total population of Montserrat was Irish slaves.

Ireland quickly became the biggest source of human livestock for English merchants. The majority of the early slaves to the New World were actually white."

Martin continues how at the hands of the British, the Irish population plummeted due to the slave trade of the 17th century. "During the 1650s, over 100,000 Irish children between the ages of 10 and 14 were taken from their parents and sold as slaves in the West Indies, Virginia and New England. In this decade, 52,000 Irish (mostly women and children) were sold to Barbados and Virginia. Another 30,000 Irish men and women were also transported and sold to the highest bidder. In 1656, Oliver Cromwell ordered that 2000 Irish children be taken to Jamaica and sold as slaves to English settlers."

Martin explains that for some reason, the Irish slaves are remembered as 'indentured servants.' However, in most cases during the 17th and 18th centuries, they were no more than "human cattle". "...the African slave trade was just beginning during this same period," writes Martin. "It is well recorded that African slaves, not tainted with the stain of the hated Catholic theology and more expensive to purchase, were often treated far better than their Irish counterparts."

During the late 1600s Martin writes African slaves were far more expensive than their Irish counterparts - Africans would sell for around £50 sterling while Irish were often no more than £5 sterling. Further, the treatment of Irish slaves was thought to be crueler

than that of African slaves. If an Irish slave was beaten by his owner, it wasn't considered to be a crime.

The Irish were further exploited when the British began to "breed" Irish women - or girls, sometimes as young as 12 - with African males. "These new "mulatto" slaves brought a higher price than Irish livestock and enabled settlers to save money rather than purchase new African slaves. This practice of interbreeding Irish females with African men went on for several decades and was so widespread that, in 1681, legislation was passed "forbidding the practice of mating Irish slave women to African slave men for the purpose of producing slaves for sale." In short, it was stopped only because it interfered with the profits of a large slave transport company."

Martin concludes, "In 1839, Britain finally decided to end participation in Satan's highway to hell and stopped transporting slaves. While their decision did not stop pirates from doing what they desired, the new law slowly concluded THIS chapter of nightmarish Irish misery."

Semi-formal/formal occasions: the AOH "uniform" is green sport coat, tri-color sash, white shirt, Irish theme tie, black trousers and optional ball cap. These occasions include AOH State and National conventions, Masses, funerals, AOH dinners, parades, and other public events.

Informal events (i.e. Division outings (ball games, picnics, meetings, etc.) the division logo polo or sweatshirts (optional ball cap) are appropriate.

Green Jacket: Brothers procure their own green jackets. One source: http://blazerdepot.com/pages/mens_blazer/augustagreenblazer.html. Visit the website; call the 800 number; tell them you're with AOH and the \$5.00 small order fee can be waived. Kelly green is the color.

AOH Sash: Brothers procure their own sashes. The AOH tri-color sash represents the national colors of Ireland and should be worn over the right shoulder (green closest to neck/collar) crossing to the left hip. Measure from right shoulder to left hip in inches; keep in mind the sash will normally be worn over a jacket, possibly a raincoat/overcoat (and maybe a growing waistline).
