2020 Biennial AOH Virtual Convention

Using Zoom (Version 5.1¹), the virtual convention was a great success. The Hibernians who technically engineered the convention deserve high praise. The convention was held in increments -- 4-5 hours each day for five days (17-18 July; 22 July; and 24-25 July). On average about 275-300 Hibernians were logged in a any given time. Some stats of interest: Hibernian presence is in all 50 states; there r 390 divisions, about 35,000 brothers. We elected the new National Board: President Danny O’Connell (Ohio), Vice President Sean Pender (NJ), Secretary Jere Cole (NJ no change) and Treasurer Liam McNabb (New York). We also elected six National Directors. None are from our area and their assignments will be posted on the national website.

Guest speakers included Ambassador Mulhall, and in live feeds from Ireland Sinn Féin President Mary Lou McDonald, Mairtin O Muilleoir (a Sinn Féin member), Bishop Phonsie (no kidding) from Waterford, Ireland; Malachy McAllister, and Peadar Tóibín.

Tóibín was of particular interest. He is the founder of *Aontú*, Ireland’s newest and “fastest growing” political movement. Tóibín resigned from Sinn Féin in November

2018 citing his pro-life/anti-abortion views as incompatible with the Sinn Féin agenda. He formally launched *Aontú* in January 2019. It operates in all 32 counties. *Aontú* translates to “unity” and the party’s major objective is the unity of Irish people north and south. I encourage you to visit <https://aontu.ie/> to learn more about this alternative to the other political options in Ireland.

Hibernian Brother Malachy McAllister related the story of his deportation experience. An incredible story of how ICE treated him after he voluntarily reported for deportation and how he was warmly greeted upon arrival in Dublin.

Conventioneers voted on several proposed constitutional amendments. They will be published on the National AOH website. The most contentious amendment pertained to Article XXVI, the JFK Award. One proposed change was removal of the requirement that persons nominating a candidate for the JFK award “*certify that nominees do not stand in opposition to the moral principles espoused by the Ancient Order of Hibernians*”. Fortunately, this amendment failed. Had it passed the door would be opened to nominees who may promote moralities inconsistent with our Hibernian-Catholic principles. Another proposed change designed to reinforce/expand the current rule was defeated.

Other topics included:

- Reminder that Life Membership nominations originate at the division. Nominees should have a minimum of 25 years in the Order.
- Need to use social media more, specifically Instagram and Twitter to raise our profile and recruit younger men
- We need to be in contact with both sides of the Congressional aisle to further immigration and related Irish issues
- Need to take seriously reporting our volunteer hours
- In divisions w/o an appointed Organizer, the president must assume the responsibility
- National Board established a “Digital Coordinator” who will define website standards, visit division and state websites to identify inappropriate material, and offer advice and assistance.
- FFAI Christmas Appeal chair prefers that state boards consolidate multiple division contributions of less than \$1000
- Five resolutions passed: AOH rededication to protection of our faith and church property; Hunger Strikers Legacy; Justice for Irish Victims of British

attacks; Support for Malachy McAllister; and 2020 Election Participation (details posted on National website)



Trip For Two Raffle Tickets

It is vitally important that every brother sells tickets!

On 19 July, your brothers sold tickets at St Patrick Church. Given the limited number of parishioners permitted to attend each Mass, Shawn Lenahan reported that we did “fairly well”. Joining Shawn were Dick Dowd, Bob Fitzgerald, Bill Halpin and Jack Kelly. We may have recruited three new brothers (they have applications) and renewed the interest of two previous applicants.



Bob and Jack are selling tickets like hotcakes -- it was about 100° that day!

Traditionally after Mass sales have been a major source of revenue. This will not be the case in 2020. *All of us must sell as many tickets as possible.* We are scheduled to return to St Patrick on 16 Aug and 6 Sept. (As of today, the division is obligated to provide \$1500 (one Scholastic Award) and \$2500 (raffle winner).



Continuing the theme of Irish enslaved...

The Irish of Jamaica from *Irish America*, by Ray Cavanaugh, downloaded 8 Feb 2020 and edited for Meagher’s Dispatches

Irish is Jamaica’s second-most predominant ethnicity.

Between 1641 and 1652, about half the Irish population had been wiped out by war, famine, plague, and slavery. As part of his “Western Design,” Lord Protector Oliver Cromwell was expanding his power in the Caribbean. He purposefully enslaved the Irish and transported them to the West Indies.

- Elliott O’Donnell’s 1915 book *The Irish Abroad* paints a vivid scene: “Gangs of [Cromwell’s] soldiers invaded Connaught and pouncing on all the women and girls they could find, drove them in gangs to Cork.” At Cork, the slave catchers began to assess their plunder, among other activities.
- Lerone Bennett, Jr.’s 1969 *Ebony* magazine article, “*White Servitude in America*” mentions various colonial undertakings involving white cargo, including a special 1655 project to bring “some 1,000 young Irish girls to Jamaica for breeding purposes.” His article talks about a colonial tradition that saw “whites, blacks, and reds” being “sold from the same stand.”
- John P. Prendergast’s 1868 work *The Cromwellian Settlement of Ireland* tells of a 1654 law requiring “all wanderers, men and women, and such other Irish” who were lacking a “settled course of industry” be “transported to the West Indies.” Also ordered for transport were “all prisoners” and “such children as were in hospitals or workhouses.”
- James C. Ballagh’s 1895 work *White Servitude in the Colony of Virginia* says: “Oliver Cromwell in preparing for his settlement of Ireland did not hesitate to transport large numbers of the dispossessed Irish as slaves to the West Indies.”
- Rev. John Lynch writing in the 1660s authored *Cambrensis Eversus*. He describes the Caribbean-bound Irish: “many droves of old men and youths [and] a vast multitude of virgins and matrons ... the former might pass their lives in hard slavery, and the latter maintain themselves even by their own prostitution.” Lynch added: “Many priests are sent away to the islands of the Indies that they might be sold by auction.”
- G. Robert Wynne, an Anglican minister, in his Sixth Donnellan Lecture in 1901, remarked: “The victories of Cromwell in the English and Irish wars of the Long Parliament furnished thousands of white slaves to till the fertile Jamaican valleys.”

Catholicism was suppressed in Jamaica faded away within a few generations. However, other signs of Irishness took hold. Among them is the prominence of Irish surnames. In Jamaica today the names Burke, Collins, Kennedy, Mackey, McCormack, McDermott, McKeon, O’Hare, or Walsh, along with many others are commonplace.

Some of the most eminent Jamaicans have been of Irish extraction. Among these are Alexander Bustamante, Jamaica's first prime minister whose father, Robert Constantine Clarke, was an Irishman, and Claude McKay, the native Jamaican writer who later would migrate to New York City and help spark the Harlem Renaissance.

General Meagher Division Attire

Every brother should have these articles of clothing:

Semi-formal/formal occasions: the AOH “uniform” is green sport coat, tri-color sash, white shirt, Irish theme tie, black trousers and optional ball cap. These occasions include AOH State and National conventions, Masses, funerals, AOH dinners, parades, and other public events.

Informal events (i.e. Division outings (ball games, picnics, meetings, etc.) the division logo polo or sweatshirts (optional ball cap) are appropriate.

Green Jacket: Brothers procure their own green jackets. One source: http://blazerdepot.com/pages/mens_blazer/augustagreenblazer.html. Visit the website; call the 800 number; tell them you’re with AOH and the \$5.00 small order fee can be waived. Kelly green is the color.

AOH Sash: Brothers procure their own sashes. The AOH tri-color sash represents the national colors of Ireland and should be worn over the right shoulder (green closest to neck/collar) crossing to the left hip. Measure from right shoulder to left hip in inches; keep in mind the sash will normally be worn over a jacket, possibly a raincoat/overcoat (and maybe a growing waistline).
