Born and raised in Boston, Boston College class of '63, USAF twenty-five years, Viet Nam Veteran, devout Catholic and outstanding example of Hibernian zeal.

John was a Hibernian's Hibernian, always ready and willing to support the General Meagher Division in so many ways, it would be difficult to list all. Suffice it to say that if there was a task to be accomplished, a Hibernian presence required, a leadership challenge to overcome, John was always present for duty. It didn't matter where or when: Hibernian day trips and luncheons, celebrating IAHM at area libraries, presenting wreaths at Irish brigade memorials, as parish liaison, at annual golf tourneys, parish festivals, selling T4T raffle tickets at every TFM division parish.

John's accomplishments were recognized when he was voted to be the General Meagher Division Hibernian of the Year in 2015.





John died at 6:20AM on Monday 14 February after a lengthy illness. John was buried in his green jacket and tri-color sash . He asked for green jacketed Hibernians be the pallbearers at his funeral. His presence and energy will be missed.





The Irishman Who Invented the Submarine (Adapted from an article by Teresa O'Dea Hein, August 12, 2014)

John Philip Holland, a Clare man recognized as "the father of the modern submarine." Holland's pioneering work on submarines was done after he emigrated to the United States in 1873.

Despite many challenging times and rough currents, Holland persevered for decades to perfect his vision of a submersible craft. For all his life, the sea was an essential element of Holland's life. It started with his father, John Holland, who patrolled the headlands of Clare as a "riding officer," a roving coastal patrolman with the British Coastguard Service. Holland was born on the wild Atlantic coastline of Liscannor, just north of Lahinch. Holland attended the Christian Brothers School (C.B.S.) in the nearby town of Ennistymon.

In 1852, his father retired and the family moved to Limerick where Holland studied at the Limerick C.B.S. Later he taught in several Christian Brothers schools in Ireland and joined the Christian Brothers and took the name of Brother Philip.

On Nov. 3, 1858, Brother Philip was assigned to the North Monastery school in Cork where he met Brother James Dominic Burke, a Limerick man, noted science teacher and founder of vocational training in Ireland. Burke encouraged Holland in his plans for a submarine and as early as 1859, he completed his first drafts of a sub, a design he never radically changed. Over the years, the inventive Holland built useful items at the schools where he taught.

Ill health later forced him to leave the Christian Brothers in 1873. By then, Holland's mother and two brothers had emigrated to Boston. He booked passage – in steerage – to meet them there and worked for a time with an engineering firm. Holland joined St. John's Parochial School in Paterson, N.J., as a lay teacher again under the auspices of the Christian Brothers.

Funding for development of the submarine was provided by Holland's brother, Michael, who was involved with the Fenian Movement. The Fenians and the inventor teamed up in an effort to build a submarine to use against the British Navy. The *Fenian Ram*, designed for the Fenian Brotherhood, was launched in 1881. It was funded by the Fenian Skirmishing Fund.

Throughout the next two decades, Holland collaborated with corporate backers to advance submarine prototypes. Successes he achieved were accompanied by financial and bureaucratic struggles. On St. Patrick's Day 1898 Holland's first full-fledged trial run of diving and surfacing while underway off Staten Island in his *Holland VI* was successful.

A demonstration 10 days later for the U.S. Navy convinced Assistant Secretary of the Navy Theodore Roosevelt to recommend the purchase of a Holland submarine.

On April 11, 1900, the date now celebrated as the birthday of the U.S. Submarine Force, the Navy bought *Holland VI*—for \$150,000, just half of its design cost. The Navy quickly ordered seven more and on October 12, 1900, the Navy's first submarine was officially commissioned as USS *Holland* (later SS-1). The 53-ft.-long submersible incorporated the design principles validated in the *Fenian Ram* and became the prototype for modern submarines. Over the years, the U.S. Navy has named two submarine tenders for John Holland: USS *Holland* (AS-3), commissioned in 1926; and a second USS *Holland* (AS-32), commissioned in 1963.



Holland died at the age of 73 and is buried in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Totowa, N.J., just a mile from the Passaic River where he first tested *Holland* I in 1878. His gravestone includes a sculptural version of this iconic photo – characterized by his walrus mustache and bowler hat as he emerged from the *Holland VI*.

In 1964, a plaque was erected in Liscannor commemorating the fiftieth anniversary of his death. Castle Street has also been renamed Holland Street in his honor. (Photo from Wikipedia)

Semi-formal/formal occasions: The AOH "uniform" is green sport coat, tri-color sash, white shirt, Irish theme tie, black trousers and optional ball cap. These occasions include AOH Masses, funerals, dinners, parades, State and National conventions, and other public events.

Informal events (i.e. Division outings (ball games, picnics, meetings, etc.) the division logo polo or sweatshirts (optional ball cap) are appropriate.

Division Logo Items: Point of Contact for Division logo polo shirts, sweatshirts and ball caps is Shawn Lenahan (<u>s_lenahan@verizon.net</u>)

Green Jacket: Brothers procure their own green jackets. One source: <u>http://blazerdepot.com/pages/mens_blazer/augustagreenblazer.html</u>. Visit the website; call the

800 number; tell them you're with AOH and the \$5.00 small order fee can be waived. Kelly green is the color.

AOH Sash: Brothers procure their own sashes. The AOH tri-color sash represents the national colors of Ireland and should be worn over the right shoulder (green closest to collar) crossing to the left hip. Measure from right shoulder to left hip in inches; keep in mind the sash will normally be worn over a jacket, a raincoat/overcoat (and a growing waistline). Sashes are available from:
