Fredericksburg Country Club, Firebirds, and many others are too numerous to mention.



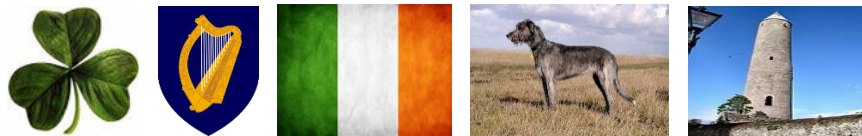
### Division Support to Parish Workcamp Projects

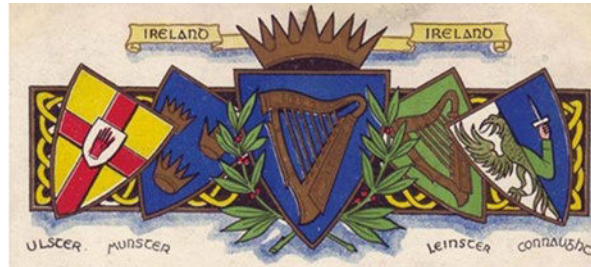

### 2023 Marks the 225th Anniversary of the 1798 Rebellion

According to Justin McCarthy's *Ireland Since the Union*<sup>1</sup>, published in 1887, the outcome of the Rising in 1798 was a foregone conclusion. Thomas Flanagan's *Year of the French*<sup>2</sup> aptly chronicles the Rising; however, McCarthy tells the backstory. In the late 18<sup>th</sup> century Irishmen were tired of the "system of savage repression" described as worse than the atrocities of Cromwell's occupation -- including house burnings, torture of captives, and pitchcapping. Inspired by the successful revolutions in America and France, the idea of Irish nationalism influenced Catholics and Presbyterians to rise above sectarian issues and join together in an effort to free Ireland.



An underground republican group founded by Theobald Wolfe Tone and known as the Society of United Irishmen instigated a major uprising against British. The majority of the leadership was Protestant until they formed an alliance with a militant underground Catholic group called the Defenders. The United Irishmen's three inspirational leaders were Theobald Wolfe Tone, Edward Fitzgerald the Commander-in-Chief of the United Irishman, and Wexford's Father John Murphy.

Fearing arrest, Tone travelled to America in 1796 where he gained financial and moral support. Then he visited France and convinced the French to support the rebellion. They attempted to land 15,000 troops near Cork during the winter of 1796–97 but the fleet was driven off course by a hurricane and could not land on the Irish coast. The French lost 12 ships and countless troops in the storm.

According to McCarthy "the organization was literally infested with spies" and the English could have arrested the leaders at any time. However, the English favored a plan to permit escalation, provoke a general revolt, and then crush the entire rebel organization "forever".

One English spy was Thomas Reynolds, Wolfe Tone's brother-in-law. He provided the English with rebel passwords and secret meeting locations. Based on Reynold's information, in spring 1798 the English raided a clandestine meeting in Dublin and arrested 14 key United Irishmen leaders. Another traitor, Francis Higgins, compromised Fitzgerald's Dublin hideout. Soldiers, led by the infamous Major Henry Sirr were sent to arrest Fitzgerald. He fought back, killing one attacker, but suffered multiple wounds himself. He was taken to prison where he died as a result of wounds in May 1798. Fitzgerald is pictured here.



In County Wexford the rebellion gained momentum as Father Murphy led the rebels in the southeast. In early June, the United Irishmen in Counties Antrim and Down, rose in support of their southern comrades. The Irish suffered defeat at Vinegar Hill, where Father Murphy was captured after the battle of Scollagh Gap/Kilcumney Hill (Co. Carlow) in June 1798. He was hanged in Tullow on 2 July. His severed head was spiked and placed on a pole in the market square<sup>3</sup>.

Wolf Tone again convinced the French to send troops to Ireland and the rebellion was renewed. In August, the French succeeded in a second landing albeit with a smaller force at Killala Bay, County Mayo. With only around 1,100 men, the French commander was to rely on the Irish to rise en masse. The French/Irish fighters had a series of victories including defeating the English Army at Castlebar. This victory prompted a declaration of the "Irish Republic". Sadly, the French/Irish were defeated in July. The British massed a force of 26,000 men under Cornwallis. The French/Irish forces faced an overwhelming enemy and were crushed at the Battle of Ballinamuck on 8 Sept. The French commander surrendered. Many Irish did not lay down their arms and many were bayoneted. French troops were repatriated to France while Irish troops were summarily executed.

Tone was captured, tried and sentenced to death by hanging. At sentencing he demanded death by firing squad -- hanging was for criminals. The English refused the firing squad. On execution day Tone was found in his cell with his throat cut. The English reported he'd committed suicide, but this may not be the case. Tone held in solitary confinement and did not have access to a knife. He was not authorized to have visitors; however, for unknown reason the English made one exception. "An emigrant French surgeon" visited him the evening before he was found and some believe him to be Tone's murderer.<sup>3</sup>

## **Hibernian Attire**

**Green Jacket:** Brothers procure their own green jackets -- Kelly green is the color.

**AOH Sash:** Brothers procure their own sashes. The AOH tri-color sash represents the national colors of Ireland and should be worn over the right shoulder (green closest to collar) crossing to the left hip. Measure from right shoulder to left hip in inches; keep in mind the sash will normally be worn over a jacket, a raincoat/overcoat (and a growing waistline). Sashes are available from:
