September 13th is a legal holiday in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and the only constitutionally mandated observance of the Ancient Order of the Hibernians. We can credit Jack O'Brien and John McInerney, District of Columbia AOH members, who worked relentlessly for more than three years to build support and raise funds for this memorial.

Commodore John Barry (1745-1803) was a native of County Wexford and a Continental Navy hero of the American War for Independence. Barry's many victories at sea were important to the morale of the Patriots as well as to the successful prosecution of the War. When the First Congress, authorized the United States Navy, George Washington turned to Barry to lead the nation's new

U.S. Navy. Barry was given the rank of Captain with “Commission No. 1,” United States Navy, effective June 7, 1794 . Barry then supervised the construction of his own flagship, the USS United States. As commander of the first U.S. naval squadron, which included the USS Constitution (Old Ironsides”), Barry was a Commodore with the right to fly a broad pennant, which recognized him as a flag officer. He served as the senior officer of the United States Navy, with the title of “Commodore” under Presidents George Washington, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson.

The ships built by Barry and the captains selected and trained by him, constituted a U.S. Navy that performed outstanding service in battles with the Barbary Pirates and in America’s Second War for Independence. the War of 1812. Significantly, and by joint resolution of Congress, pursuant to Public Law 109-142 (signed by President George W. Bush on December 22, 2005), John Barry was formally recognized, in the Public Law of the United States, as the first flag officer of the U.S. Navy, ergo Father of the U.S. Navy. 1690: Rebellion and Legacy of the “Wild Geese”

Based on annual Orange Order parades and bonfires one might conclude the Battle of the Boyne took place on 12 July 1690. Not so, but that’s another story. In the Battle of the Boyne on July 1, 1690, William of Orange defeated King James' army. But that was only a battle, it was not a decisive victory. The Irish rebellion continued for more than a year as the Irish fought for sovereignty, religious tolerance for Catholicism, and land ownership.

The Battle of Aughrim (July 1691) was probably the bloodiest day in Irish history. The Irish were on the verge of defeating the English when a cannonball decapitated the Irish commander. Without his leadership, confusion reigned, the defense faltered, and potential victory turned into defeat. Patrick Sarsfield assumed command and fought the Williamite army to a standstill. However, his army depleted, Sarsfield retreated to Limerick. He fortified the Limerick garrison and endured a long siege until he was forced by disease and starvation to negotiate a surrender. According to military historian Richard Doherty, Sarsfield may have concluded the Jacobite cause would benefit if Irish soldiers were to fight with the French where they could plan an invasion of the British Isles. The Treaty of Limerick brought the rebellion to its end in October 1691.

Under the terms of surrender, the Irish were given the option of sailing to France to join King James II, in exile. Shortly after Sarsfield signed the treaty, a French fleet arrived with reinforcements and urged Sarsfield to tear up the treaty and fight on. Sarsfield had given his word of honor when he signed the treaty and refused this temptation. He led an estimated twenty thousand Irish soldiers and family members to France.

The British immediately disgraced the treaty Sarsfield honored by implementing what we know as the Penal Laws. These laws deprived Irish Catholics every right of citizenship.

For the next hundred years "*Cuimnidh ar Luimneach agus ar Feall na Sasanach!*" (Remember Limerick and the Saxon betrayal) was the French Irish Brigade's battle cry. The "Wild Geese" fought in battles all over Europe and the world, many looking for ways to fight the eternal enemy, England.

The term "Wild Geese" originated when French ships smuggling brandy and wine into Ireland used the return trip to ferry recruits for the French Irish Brigade. In the ships' logs the recruits were listed as wild geese.

The term "Wild Geese" is usually associated France's Irish Brigades, however, many Irish served in Spain, Austria, Russia, Poland and the German Kingdoms. Several "Wild Geese" rose to prominence in European armies. George Brown was made a Field Marshal of the Austrian Army. Francis Maurice Lacy was a Field Marshall in both the Austrian and Russian armies. Patrice McMahon, a descendant of the Limerick Wild Geese, became President of France. In South America, Bernardo O'Higgins, son of a Sligo native and general in the Spanish Army, became the Liberator of Chile. Admiral William Brown of County Mayo became the Father of the Argentine Navy.

Closer to home, members of the French Irish Brigade served with John Paul Jones on the "Bonhomme Richard" and others were at Yorktown with Rochambeau. The Spanish Hibernian regiment, known as O'Neill's Regiment, fought the English at Pensacola (Florida) in 1781. Thousands of Irishmen in America -- no less "Wild Geese" than the others -- made up the bulk of Washington's Continental Army -- 22 rose to be generals. They fought in America and accomplished what their fathers could not do in Ireland: Throw off the oppressive yoke of England.

Excerpted for W.B. Yeats' poem *September 1913* :

Was it for this the wild geese spread
The grey wing upon every tide;
For this that all that blood was shed,
For this Edward Fitzgerald died,
And Robert Emmet and Wolfe Tone,
All that delirium of the brave?
Romantic Ireland's dead and gone,
It's with O'Leary in the grave.

Every brother should have these articles of clothing

Green Jacket: Brothers procure their own green jackets -- Kelly green is the color.

AOH Sash: Brothers procure their own sashes. The AOH tri-color sash represents the national colors of Ireland and should be worn over the right shoulder (green closest to collar) crossing to the left hip. Measure from right shoulder to left hip in inches; keep in mind the sash will normally be worn over a jacket, a raincoat/overcoat (and a growing waistline). Sashes are available from:
